Armistice Commemoration

November 11th marked the centenary of the end of the First World War. The conflict claimed the lives of over 16 million servicemen globally including almost 40,000 of the 210,000 Irishmen, from North and South, who joined the British military. Of the 40,000 Irish servicemen who died, over 600 came from the Dun Laoghaire area, including my great-great grandfather Corporal Patrick Conway of the Royal Dublin Fusiliers who died of his wounds in France during Easter Week 1916.

The historic significance of Ireland's role in the Great War was largely and deliberately forgotten in the new Irish Free State and it was only in 2014, 100 years after the start of the conflict, that we as a nation begin to rediscover Ireland's role in the war. With this in mind, I approached the task of organising CBC's Commemorations of the 1918 Armistice on November 9th. It was an honour to officiate at the school's Ceremony of Remembrance as Master of Ceremonies and a privilege to welcome Cllr. Cormac Devlin, Deacon Eric Cooney of Monkstown Parish and Mr John Burke of the Royal British Legion, Dun Laoghaire Branch. Cllr. Devlin officially opened the Ceremony with a speech about the Dun Laoghaire-Rathdown area and Ireland in World War I. Deacon Cooney led the school in prayers of remembrance and Mr Burke spoke about several men from our local area who fought and died in the war and he outlined the work that the Royal British Legion does in the Dun Laoghaire. The ceremony culminated in two minutes' silence at 12 noon and also incorporated poetry readings and a musical performance.

It is my hope that the CBC Ceremony of Remembrance helped to highlight Ireland's role in World War I and the sacrifices made by Irish people. Ar eagla go ndéanfaimis dearmad. Lest we forget our glorious dead.

They will now embark on their work experience for the next two weeks.


Twitter Treasure Hunt
